
As a true lover of travel, having adventured around the world both solo and with my best friends, it is still family holidays that I treasure the most.

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Phinda Private Game Reserve, South Africa



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Picnics are always a family favourite, providing room for the little ones to roam and gourmet treats for mum and dad. Some hotels are dialling the experience up a notch, creating packages ideal for a staycation or a short family getaway.

A cosy winter getaway with the family, voco Kirkton Park is a prestigious estate located on 70 acres of rolling countryside with spectacular mountain views. The property is offering the Ultimate Hunter Hamper, which includes a choice of four local Hunter Valley cheeses, local wine, estate honey, Hunter Valley olives, fresh strawberries and mixed nuts, a picnic basket and blanket. There is also the High Cheese, a spin off of the classic high tea. The package features the best of Hunter cheeses (Binnorie Dairy triple cream brie, Binnorie Dairy Duetto and woodfired cooked brie to name a few), savoury sandwiches and hot savouries including mushroom and cheese arancini.

A little closer to the city and ideal for a staycation, Holiday Inn Potts Point adheres to the brand's promise where kids under 12 stay and eat for free. Families can opt for the hotel's picnic package, which is inclusive of overnight accommodation, complimentary parking, and a tailored picnic hamper. It comes complete with fresh sandwiches, cheese board, mixed nuts and dried fruit, fresh yoghurt, popcorn, a bottle of wine for the adults, and juice and water.





The return of the rock

Ayers Rock Resort in the Northern Territory reopened its doors on Saturday, and guests were greeted with a whole new look. Voyages Indigenous Tourism Australia, which operates the resort in the heart of the country, has taken advantage of the recent downtime to bring forward an extensive refurbishment.

Upgrades at the five-star Sails in the Desert hotel include revamped guest rooms and suites as well as a new-look lobby, pool and restaurant, while works have also been undertaken at The Lost Camel, the Campground and Ayers Rock Airport.

Reopening specials include discounts of up to 50% on stays of 2, 3 and 4 nights or more, and visitors can still enjoy the spectacular Field of Light installation along with an extensive range of activities including helicopter flights, camel rides, guided walks, bush tucker demonstrations and more.

Emirates adds COVID cover

Travellers who fly with Emirates are now being offered free insurance coverage for COVID-19 medical expenses and quarantine costs. The airline says that means passengers can travel

with confidence, with the offer including up to \$245,000 in medical expenses and quarantine costs of about \$160 per day for 14 days if they are diagnosed with COVID-19 during their travel.

Any traveller in any class of travel on any Emirates flight through until 31 October is included, with the coverage offered free of charge without requiring any pre-registration.

Although Australia's borders are still closed, travel for essential purposes is permitted and Emirates continues to operate flights to Sydney, Brisbane and Perth to its global network which will this month expand to 63 destinations in the Americas, Europe, Africa, the Middle East and Asia-Pacific.

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

Australians are no strangers to a safari, given this big biodiverse land of ours, and just because international travel is out, it does not mean we have to miss out on the animals. A range of zoos around the country offer close-to-home, safari-style explorations, which are often combined with on-site zoo stays. Whether or not your family holiday to Africa is out for this year, check out some of the best zoo-related activities on offer around Australia.

New South Wales

Every Sydneysider has experienced the magic of Taronga Zoo, but the closure of international borders presents the perfect time to tick off the facility's Roar & Snore. The overnight experience offers more-intimate animal encounters, talks with zookeepers, food, and safari-style accommodation with views of Sydney Harbour.

Upon arrival, guests are greeted with canapes and beverages overlooking the Opera House and Harbour Bridge, with a buffet dinner and breakfast also included later in the program. Keepers then take guests on an exclusive night safari, which involves joining in on feeding time and close encounter sessions, before unwinding in large safari-style tents. Guests can then spend the following day enjoying the zoo at

their own leisure, with the price of admission included.

Looking to get away from the city, or perhaps more of a safari-style experience? Taronga Western Plains Zoo offers a Zoofari Lodge safari experience, which also comes inclusive of meals, one night's accommodation, exclusive tours, two-day zoo entry and even bike hire, and is available to book now. Guests also get 10% off all

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additional animal encounters, as well as 10% off purchases at the zoo's souvenir shop and 10% off at the café and bar.

Explorers stay in the Zoofari Lodge, positioned right beside one of the zoo's savannahs, which is home to Western Plains' giraffes, rhinos, zebras, and antelopes. Guests can choose from an Animal View Lodge, offering a prime view of the zoo's locals, or a Bushland Lodge, which sleeps two extra people. Western Plains has also made a number of changes to ensure COVID compliance, with a two-kilometre walking tour now taking place instead of Zoofari bus tours – we think you see more on foot anyway!

Australian Capital Territory

For those looking to escape the "Taronga bubble" of Zoofari experience, the ACT's Jamala Wildlife Lodge offers a range of different experiences for all kinds of visitors. Although children under six are not typically welcome, Jamala does hold dedicated family nights once a month, where kids as young as four can get in on the fun.

Travellers will begin their stay with afternoon tea and an afternoon safari, before their evening of pre-dinner drinks and a gourmet African dinner party. The following day sees breakfast and another safari zoo tour before your experience comes to an end.

What separates Jamala is the range of accommodation offered. The Lodge's giraffe treehouses allow guests to overlook the resident herd of longnecked locals, and even offers the opportunity to feed a giraffe either from your balcony or in his enclosure – he is known for making up your mind for you! All treehouses feature king beds, bathtubs, bathrobes, climate control, complimentary wi-fi and a music system.

Camping is one of the best ways to spend time as a family. Here's four reasons to pack your bags and get away from it all.




Get on the road

Royal Caribbean International





Ingredients

30ml White rum
30ml Triple sec
30ml Davidson Plum puree
15ml Sugar syrup
15ml Freshly squeezed lemon juice
Lime wheel to garnish

Method

Add 4 cubes of ice & all ingredients in a cocktail shaker. Shake thoroughly. In a separate jug or shaker, add 4 cubes of ice and crush.

Place crushed ice into a chilled Margarita glass.
Strain the cocktail mix into the glass.
Garnish with lime wheel.
